From Father Nik

As he was now drawing near [to Jerusalem], at the descent of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works that they had seen, saying, "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" And some of the Pharisees in the multitude said to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples." He answered, "I tell you, if [they] were silent, the very stones would cry out.

~Luke 19:37-48

When Jesus rides into Jerusalem, he does so as a king. In Luke's Gospel, the emphasis is not on him being a king *like David*—that is, a king of the Judeans, a king of Israel. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus rides in as the King of God's whole Kingdom, Lord of all Creation. At face value, this appears ironic. Here is a poor, Galilean peasant laborer-*turned*-prophetic teacher riding a donkey into the capital city of a province on the edge of the greatest Empire on earth, and his disciples claim he is God's anointed King of all Creation. It's hard to imagine anyone taking this seriously, but the crowd does. And the Pharisees—who surely don't take the spectacle seriously but are probably anxious that Pontius Pilate won't appreciate the irony—try to get Jesus to calm the crowd. But Jesus is King of all Creation, so even the stones will acclaim his sovereignty.

Christ begins his triumphal descent into Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives, where days later he will suffer the betrayal, abandonment, arrest, and the anxiety of his impending fate. Now, however, he has the praise and support of his disciples and the multitude. Their cry, "Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" echoes the song of the heavenly host of angels who announced his birth at the beginning of the gospel (2:14). This journey to Jerusalem is neither whim nor happenstance, but the destiny and orientation of the life that began with that obscure birth in Bethlehem. For the good news of this king will not end with his death in Jerusalem but will *be proclaimed to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem* after his resurrection from the dead (24:47).


