This Sunday is the first Sunday of Advent. Advent, in turn, is the first season of the new liturgical year. It's a good thing, if not intuitive, to remember that the Church's calendar is not identical to the secular calendar. For the Church, the New Year doesn't begin with a ball dropped in Times Square or a party or kissing the nearest loved one, friend, or stranger. The Church doesn't ring in the New Year on January 1st with overly ambitious and hastily forgotten resolutions boldly inscribed on inspirational sticky notes stuck to the bathroom mirror or pinned to the fridge door by a magnet. For the Church, the New Year begins four Sundays before Christmas amid the gathering darkness of late autumn. For the Church, the New Year is rung in with the flame of a single candle, a slight flicker in the dark, kindling the desire for the coming of the light of the world, which the darkness cannot overcome (Jn 1:5).

Many clergy and laity who are aware of the importance and meaning of Advent can't help but bemoan the way Christmas—(particularly, in its most secular and commercial aspects)—has overtaken the first season of the Church year. Even some from less liturgical, more evangelical churches have discovered the tradition of Advent to counter the sprawl of the commercial Christmas. Valiant as this effort may be, though, it's probably to little avail given that Christmas decorations appear in the stores the day after Halloween and Santa arrives at the end of the Macy's parade on Thanksgiving Day. Those of us who get frustrated by the all-consuming Christmas have simply forgotten how exciting it was for us as children.

Every tree alight, every sighting of Santa in the parade, every decoration in a home or store fuels and ignites a child's desire for Christmas Day. And in this way, it's not so different from the practices of Advent. The gathering light of the Advent Wreath, the contemplative reading of God's promises in the Old Testament, and the prayerful recitation of Mary's Magnificat are all ways to prepare our hearts for and focus our desires towards the coming of Christ, which we celebrate on Christmas. And this helps us to see that a similar thing happens each Sunday at worship. The liturgy—the prayers, the hymns, the reading of Scripture and its exposition in the homily, the recitation of the Creed, the offering of our gifts—prepares our hearts for and focuses our desires towards Christ, so that we might see him by faith giving himself to us in the consecrated bread and wine of the Eucharist.


